Members of the Environment and Social Justice Group and St Viincent's de Paul attended an event at Hastings District Council on 16 May to learn more about the development of a new day hub for homeless in Hastings. Hastings Church, led by Pastor Warren Heke, currently provide a drop in space and meals for homeless – but more importantly they provide connection and relationship. The Hastings Church, Anglican Care Waiapu, and the Hastings District Council have formed a collaboration to set up a new day centre where homeless can access food, showers, and from which clinical and other services can be provided. The partners are currently seeking a new venue and funding to set up the operations well. There will be opportunities for our parish to be involved by providing resources, volunteers, funding, prayer, and friendship. We will keep you posted.
